#### Protecting yourself against bpl

Ohio ham radio operators are asking "What can I do about Broadband Over Powerlines (BPL)?" Well, here is a quick suggestion - conduct your own baseline measurements.

Kirk Swallow, W8QID, team leader of the Cincinnati BPL/LIC committee, suggests every Ohio ham facing a BPL installation in their area, first get baseline measurements of the local spectrum noise floor. Get these measurements recorded and documented so you will have an accurate comparison to the day you may suspect BPL interference.

Here is a quick, "cookbook" approach to making such measurements now before BPL arrives:

Use any good radio receiver having 4-20 Mhz HF receiving capabilities (your transceiver will do just fine but any good short-wave radio will do). Follow these instructions:

(1) Set up your receiver for AM reception, with the AGC set for "Fast" and Noise Blanker turned off:

(2) Several times a day or as often as you can, record your s-meter noise readings. Take tape recordings of these readings as well.

(3) Take readings both outside and inside the amateur band limits (your favorite freqs). Outside the ham radio bands, Kirk suggests known frequencies like near WWV and/or near well known foreign broadcasts.

(4) For each reading, write down carefully the date, time of day, the frequency, and the s-meter reading. Be sure there are no signals present, only noise.

Of course, said Kirk, the purpose of this exercise is to establish and document a baseline for noise at your particular location. In the event BPL does come to your area and introduces additional noise/interference in a measurable amount, you will be able to provide a before and after comparison. Such comparisons can be the basis of complaints to the power company or to the FCC, if necessary.

# From the Director – Weaver's Words

From the Great Lakes Division Director, Jim Weaver, K8JE -

The next steps that will be made with the proposal to regulate signals on our ham bands by bandwidth and no longer by mode) are as follow:

- The Board will devote several hours the night before the meeting officially begins to discussions of the changes that were proposed by the members. These suggestions have already been reviewed and digested by the Executive Committee. I've already reviewed input from members in the GLD. Many hours have been invested in these reviews, already.

And, some of you believe no one pays attention to what you thought. Well, folks, guess again.

- The Board will have further discussions beginning Friday concerning the disposition of the proposal -- modify it, submit it as is or as modified as a petition to FCC, kill the idea, keep working on it, etc.

How will I vote? I don't want to prejudge facts and arguments that will arise next week, so I don't yet know how I will vote. As I've said in these newsletters many times before, my decision as to which way to vote is dependent upon several factors. These include: 1. Domestic and international regulatory issues, 2. Input I receive from members, 3. Input from experts in the areas being considered, 4. Historic perspective and 5. Anything else I can learn about the issue from other sources.

My final vote depends upon how each of these mix together to form my final judgment. This, as SM Joe Phillips, K8QOE often says, "is the reason I make the big bucks!" (I hope you all realize the frame I have hanging on the wall to hold the very first dollar I make from being a Director is still empty. It'll remain empty throughout the rest of my years.
