Bill Craiger memorial qso party

Fifteen Meter DX

Thanks to Dave, KZ8T, for the following information about fifteen meters that might prompt some of us to fire up the HF rig and get on the 21 MHz band.

Fifteen meters has been the band of choice for me in the late afternoon. It seems as darkness moves across the Atlantic and the USA fifteen meters is open over most of the world at different times as the propagation moves west with darkness. Remember darkness starts in Europe way ahead of us. The nice thing is it is early and those ruthless DXers are still watching the evening news. The pile ups are not as bad. Hearing ZLs, Europe, sometimes Japan, and of course, due South is open if the band is open.

Later I hear much DX on 40 meters CW. But once the station hits the DX web sites the pileups get not only big but the CBer in us comes out. Many stations are calling when they obviously can not hear the DX station, some just to cover them up. Sometimes I grab one but often not. I worked Africa last night on 7.004 MHz after much patience. Please be nice. If you can't handle the bad operation and numbers don't add to it, go somewhere else.

From the Repeater

I have not been to any of our repeater sites for a couple months. Things seem to be settling down and have been holding up well. Lately I have been hearing some spurious noise occasionally being repeated. These noises are very weak signals and do not cover up weak signals on the repeater. Some of this will simply have to be put up with because we choose not to leave the PL* requirement turned on, thus allowing new hams and travelers to more easily use our repeater. Many repeaters have been forced to go to full time PL to overcome this. Some of this simply goes away as other transmitters in the area correct their problem. The rest is up to us. Normally we make a couple of trips a year to tighten connections and tune receivers. A couple of months ago I installed a GE receiver pre-amp, this will somewhat increase our local noise as well as desired signals. So far the results are good.

Most hams have no conception how difficult it is to "Duplex." Meaning to transmit and receive using the same antenna and feed line. Look at it this way, we often have overload problems from transmitters close by or just very strong. Well, multiply this threat by a couple hundred when this transmitter is on the same antenna and even contained in the same cabinet.

A reminder, our repeater has a "Courtesy tone." It is called a courtesy tone for a reason. Its purpose is to force users to allow time for "breakers" and let us know the timer has reset. To break in a QSO on our repeater try to key between when the last person transmitting un keys and the courtesy tone. Users do not need to allow the transmitter to drop before beginning to transmit. I often hear users confused by this, probably because not all repeaters operate this way. This fact does not make either method wrong. Our timers are all set as they were from the factory.

I still occasionally hear someone using a "cross band repeat" frequency near our link frequencies. I would like to ask please do not use frequencies between 446.520 and 446.555 for your links. This is one of our sources of noise on the repeater.

* PL is a Motorola trade name. The actual generic name is "continuous sub audible tone." GE calls it "Channel Guard."
