## A Word from the Prez

Hamfests- What the "Hamvention" had to say.

Since we are fast approaching the WARA Hamfest (I know with the snow lately it does not seem like it) I thought I would share this information with you. This information comes from a single page brochure that was handed out at last years "Hamvention". And it speaks to the slight decline we have all noticed of the bread and butter of an Amateur Radio Club, or the annual "Hamfest". I have taken editorial justice with it to make it more meaningful for our situation.

Mailing Brochures:

Creating large, wordy, brochures and then mass mailing those costs a lot of money. And is only as good as your mailing list, hopefully updated and computerized from your last Hamfest. So what they did was to run smaller ads in publications (like we do in the "Freepress" and such). Then do some small post card size mailings, and depend on "word of mouth", a "Hams" memory of a good time last year, and the Internet. One new thing that they did last year that we could also investigate, is offering ticket sales "on-line" through their Web Site for flea market spaces, exhibitor booths, and normal entrance tickets. This is something I will be checking into and hope to have some information for the Club by the next meeting. In their case, last year on-line sales exceeded mailed in requests.

One other good idea, which we follow already, is to get our Hamfest flyers to as many Hamfests around our area and directly to the Hamvention for those club members who are going. By taking them there it certainly goes right to our Customers! Also dropping some off at AES (a good excuse for going to the candy store) also works well.

The "Hamvention" article also goes further to explain that while attendance has shrunk some from prior years that is not necessarily a bad thing. What it means is that Clubs, like ours, have to be more creative in bringing in the people. Things like our Motorcycle Show, "Make and Take", "Home Brew Contest", and other new ideas. These are things we have talked about and will be applying to this years Hamfest and all will help the bottom line. And they do not necessarily detract from the "Hamfest" concept: They all bring new "potential" Amateur Radio Operators to our event who just might get hooked by having attended a seminar on "Skywarn", or who wish to see what "Home Brew" is all about.

So, overall I think we as a Club are heading in the right direction to continue to make the WARA Hamfest a successful money (and fun) making proposition for the Club. We have good directions from our Hamfest Chairperson and many good ideas come from our Hamfest Committee meetings. So why don't you attend the next Hamfest meeting, or volunteer to help out this year. It's our Hamfest and it's up to all of us to make it a continual success each year.

### A Note from Joe

Now and then we get an article from Joe Wehner, W8KNO, and they usually have some in-built wisdom that's worth sharing. This is one of those notes.

I recently worked and received a QSL card from K4KSC. K4KSC is the club call for the Titusville Amateur Radio Club. Titusville, if you are not familiar with Florida, is on the main land just north of the Kennedy Space Center. Looking at the card you can recognize the first vertical assembly building, the Apollo capsule with the emergency jettison system sticking out front and the Space Shuttle. The card was issued for the Kennedy Space Center All American Picnic and the Return to Flight Rally. But the card did more than honor the special event, it brought back memories that are parts of history that so easily get forgotten. Let me explain. During October 1957 while attending prep school at Bainbridge, Maryland; I went home for a weekend to attend the Ramsey High School Alumni play the Hawthorne High School Alumni in football. Just as the second half started, the game was halted and the lights dimmed so everyone could observe Sputnik's transit. What an impact a 184 pound basketball sized satellite that went "BEEP -- BEEP" had on the world. We still see in the comic strips satellites going "BEEP -- BEEP -- BEEP." The United states had been in a race with the Russians to put the first satellite into space. The US's launch vehicle was the Vanguard missile. While stationed aboard the USS Toledo (CA-133), I had been responsible for the AN/SPQ-2 radar which was the guidance system for the Regulus missile program. We practiced with aircraft flying out of Point Magu, California. During one of the test flights, we had an engineer come aboard and he gave a talk to OE Division on the Vanguard missile. The interesting thing that I remember is that it was to launch vertically and after reaching altitude turn ninety degrees and fly into orbit. The concept was good but the execution was bad or just before its time. In January 1958, the US launched its own satellite on a rocket designed by Werner Van Braun. On his team was James Van Allen, his satellite discovered the magnetic radiation belts which carry his name.

The race to space between the US and Russia continued and in April 1961 the Russians launched the first person into space, Yuri Gagarin. The US' Mercury Project first person in space was Alan Shepard followed by Gus Grissom. Finally the US made an orbital flight, the pilot was Ohio's own John Glenn. The Mercury Project was followed by the Gemini Project, a two man mission. The first flight was commanded by Gus Grissom and piloted by John Young. Both the Mercury and Gemini projects were stepping stones to Project Apollo which was to land on and return men from the moon. The first Apollo manned flight consisted of a three man crew made up of Wally Schirra, Dann Eisele and Walter Cunningham. The first lunar landing was made by Apollo 11, probably the most famous composed of Neil Armstrong, Michael Collins and Ed Aldrin. The last landing was made by Apollo 17. Only Apollo 13 did not land on the moon and was considered a "Successful Failure".

The space program has become so commonplace that if it were not for the NASA Channel we would not know what is going on. Every launch was covered live and now you are lucky to see a fifteen second clip of the launch or landing.

Because of the increase interest in Einstein's theory of general relativity, we might be able to say the that the space program can be summarized as:

Man came from Heaven to Earth,

Now man travels from Earth to the Heavens!
