As I am writing this one week after our participation in the 2005 ARRL Field Day I am thinking to myself what can we improve on? And that is a hard one as everything came together quite nicely with the efforts of our Field Day Chairpersons, Lisa (KC8VHB), Emily (KC8RAL), and Gail (KC8LRH). Not to mention all of those of you that stopped out to help with the setup or operate. So let's first just talk about what all fun we had.

We started Friday night with setting up the dipoles in the trees with expert bowmen Gail, assisted by Billy (N8VOR). Then we put the tents in order and made sure that we were ready to go, as far as most of the manual work was considered. I can tell you that it was a little warm out there so plenty of water and ice was in order. Saturday morning rolled around and the QTH was a flurry of activity as the final coax was connected and the last SWR measurement was taken. At this time the solar powered ATV system was trained on route 422 and the driveway, just so no one could sneak up on us! HI HI

When the starting time for Field Day came upon us, the generator's were started and the radio's were officially placed on the air. This was the start of 24 hours of pure fun as a 5A station for the Warren Amateur Radio Association. As far as the first station contacted, it seems to be K4YTZ on 14.224 MHz at 18:19 UTC, just 19 minutes after the start of the event. Now who made that first contact I can not tell you as I did not have the operators name on the log. Well that something to improve on next year. Over all, unofficially we made around 431 contacts, with around 100 of those on CW. Not too bad in my opinion.

We had a variety of "Bonus Points" activities during this year's field day. Besides running on 100% Emergency Power we did have a "Public Information Table", "Alternate Power Station", "Non-Traditional Mode Demo" (ATV), "Portable Packet Station", "Site Visit From Representative of Agency/Governmental Official", "GOTA Station", and finally "Youth Participation (under 18 years). And we did copy the W1AW bulletin. So we just about covered most of those activities that gave us some extra points. Sure there were some we missed but that will give us something to shoot for next year.

Beside just running radio's, there was time to visit with friends, eat some great food, teach Amateur Radio to some non-hams, eat some more food, and have a great bonfire on Saturday night. The bonfire was a special event for me as it was started by none other than the Captain of the Middlefield Fire Department (Dan Rhodes)! Which was great as it got me off the hook for problems if the fire would have gotten out of control. He was also our official visitor that helped us gain some of those bonus points. So overall we did accomplish many of the ten items for a successful field day I quoted from an article on ARRL at our last meeting.

Now what can we do better? Well I think making sure we all know what information to log when we make contacts is one area we can improve on. It makes the job of the person who is filing the club's entry with the ARRL a lot easier if all the information is there. And since it's me this year that has that task, it really hits home. So next year I'll make sure we have an informal meeting prior to the start, to make sure all operators know what information is needed in the log.

The next, and probably most important improvement, is Club participation. For a club of our size I was surprised we did not have more club members turn out for this years Field Day. I view Field Day as the second most important annual event an Amateur Radio Club can have each year. Second only to our annual Ham Fest. Now maybe it was the heat, because it sure was hot that weekend ,but I would have liked to see more participation in this Club event. Especially if member's were having their own individual Field Day's, instead of participating in the Club's.

Many members come together to get the Field Day site setup and ready to go so that at the most to participate you would just need to show up and operate and make some contacts, and have some food while your at it. If anyone has any ideas about what we can do to increase participation in next years Field Day please bring them up at one of our Club meetings in the next few weeks, while Field Day is fresh in our minds. Oh by the way, I already have the suggestion for "air conditioning" throughout the site. HI HI. Well that's all for now. I will let everyone know the final results by the next meeting.
