Hamfest 2002

For decades the third Sunday in August has held a special place in the hearts of WARA members. That Sunday, is, of course, the annual WARA Hamfest. This year the third Sunday falls on August 18, and that is the day for this year's 2002 WARA Hamfest. Chairperson Renee McCaman, KB8SVF tells us that we will need to have as many members as possible present on that weekend to do the various jobs that have to be done for the Hamfest.

The location for this year's hamfest will be in a slightly different spot from previous years. While still at the Trumbull Campus of Kent State University, this year's hamfest will be held in the western wing of the university, the new building facing out onto Mahoning Ave.

Setup for the hamfest will begin on Saturday August 17 at about noon. This includes setting up tables, flea market

spaces, etc. As usual we will have the hamfest picnic the evening before the hamfest - see the article in this issue about the picnic. There will, of course, be many things to be done on the day by WARA members. If you want a particular job on the day, or while setting up, talk to one of the following people. Dave Walters, KZ8T is handling outside ticket sales. For inside ticket sales see Kaye Parise, N8WER. The club table, where you can sell some of your own gear, is being handled by Don Lovett, K8BXT. If you're a VE and want to help out during the testing, see Dennis Carraher, N8IVE. If you want to help sort out the flea market, see either Ray Solinger, N8HRZ, or Mike Yakopec, KA8WMF. There are obviously many jobs to do, and every bit of help will be needed for the day.

The flea market will open at 6.00 AM, and the main building at 8.00 AM. It should be pointed out that the hamfest will include a number of forums. At 10.00 AM the K8CX Callsign Blast – a CW copying contest, will be held. At 10.30 AM will be the K3LR Antenna Forum. At 11.00 AM the Storm Chaser Video will be shown.

For those interested in gaining or upgrading their amateur license, VE Exams will be held at 9.30 AM. Those wishing to test will need \$10.00, two different forms of identification, the original and photocopy of any current amateur license held, and any CSCEs held. 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Kudos

We can't let the issue go without also recognizing Lisa Eckenrode, who, as an Associate member stepped forward when she was needed and did a lot to make the TC Fair exhibit come off. Thanks Lisa, great to have you on our side.

Repeater news

The last time I wrote an article we lost the transmitter for the Newton Falls link between writing and printing. So for a few weeks we were a single site repeater. The North link being without a preamp and low profile it contributes little to the coverage. The north link now has a preamp again and the Newton Falls link is back on. We also have a spare transmitter.

Our voting is about 80 to 90 % accurate. I believe the audio from our receivers is not totally flat. All the receivers are identical but since the link audio goes through two receivers before the voter any error is doubled. The voter then favors one receiver over another. This will be the next problem addressed. This has been a busy time of year for me and I have not tried to solve the problem.

Some operating tips for this month. Our repeater has a five-second tail. One second after a user stops transmitting the repeater controller generates a courtesy tone. Four seconds later, after the tail timer times out, the transmitter drops, assuming no repeater ID is timed out. This means our repeater stops transmitting five seconds after a user stops transmitting. This is the maximum allowed by the FCC. This is the way it has been since installation around 1980. Some repeaters have gone to a shorter tail. Amateurs wishing to break into a QSO often wait until the repeater drops to transmit. On our repeater this will not work well because users do not let the repeater drop in normal use. To break on our repeater it is easy to tell when a user unkeys their transmitter since a slight squelch tail can be heard. Then, there is one second until the courtesy tone. Nearly all users allow another couple of seconds before beginning to transmit. This is the time to break in. A breaking station should hold their microphone ready to transmit. As soon as they hear the user unkey they should transmit and announce their intention.

What the breaking station should say is not important. I've heard lots of opinions on this subject, but the important things are to be courteous and to the point. That said, here is what I read in an ARRL operating manual fifteen or twenty years ago, and this is how I break. For a break of no importance and no hurry, simply state your call and wait to be acknowledged.

If you have a need to break with some importance but not an emergency say

the word "break" one time and wait to be acknowledged.

If the matter is an emergency you should wait for the station to unkey, Say "Break, Break, Break." Three breaks is an emergency signal. However since most hams don't know this you might consider also saying, "I have an emergency."

Despite what I heard someone say on the air, the word break did not come from the Citizens Band. The Citizens band copied it from hams. We just don't add all that much "flare" to it.

A seldom-used feature of our repeater is "Voice-mail." A message can be recorded on the DVR (Digital Voice recorder) and left on the repeater. This might be used, for example, to leave a message on the repeater that the meeting had been canceled. To do this the procedure would be as follows.

is your message for?" Then leave your message. For example, you might say "WARA meeting canceled." The time for the message is short, only a few seconds, so be very brief. The repeater will say "Please leave your message," and you might say, The WARA meeting has been canceled because of the heavy snow."

To play a message back, enter a 4 touch-tone. Unkey and listen. The repeater will play the announcements of each message that have been left. If there is only one or the one you want to hear is the first one, you can retreive it by entering 41 - touch-tone. If your message is the second one on the list then enter 42 - touch-tone, and so on.

To erase a message first play it. Then enter 4** touch-tone.

Key the microphone, identify, (don't forget the three second timer.) enter 4* unkey. The repeater will respond, "Who
